




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**How do we protect the

Key areas:

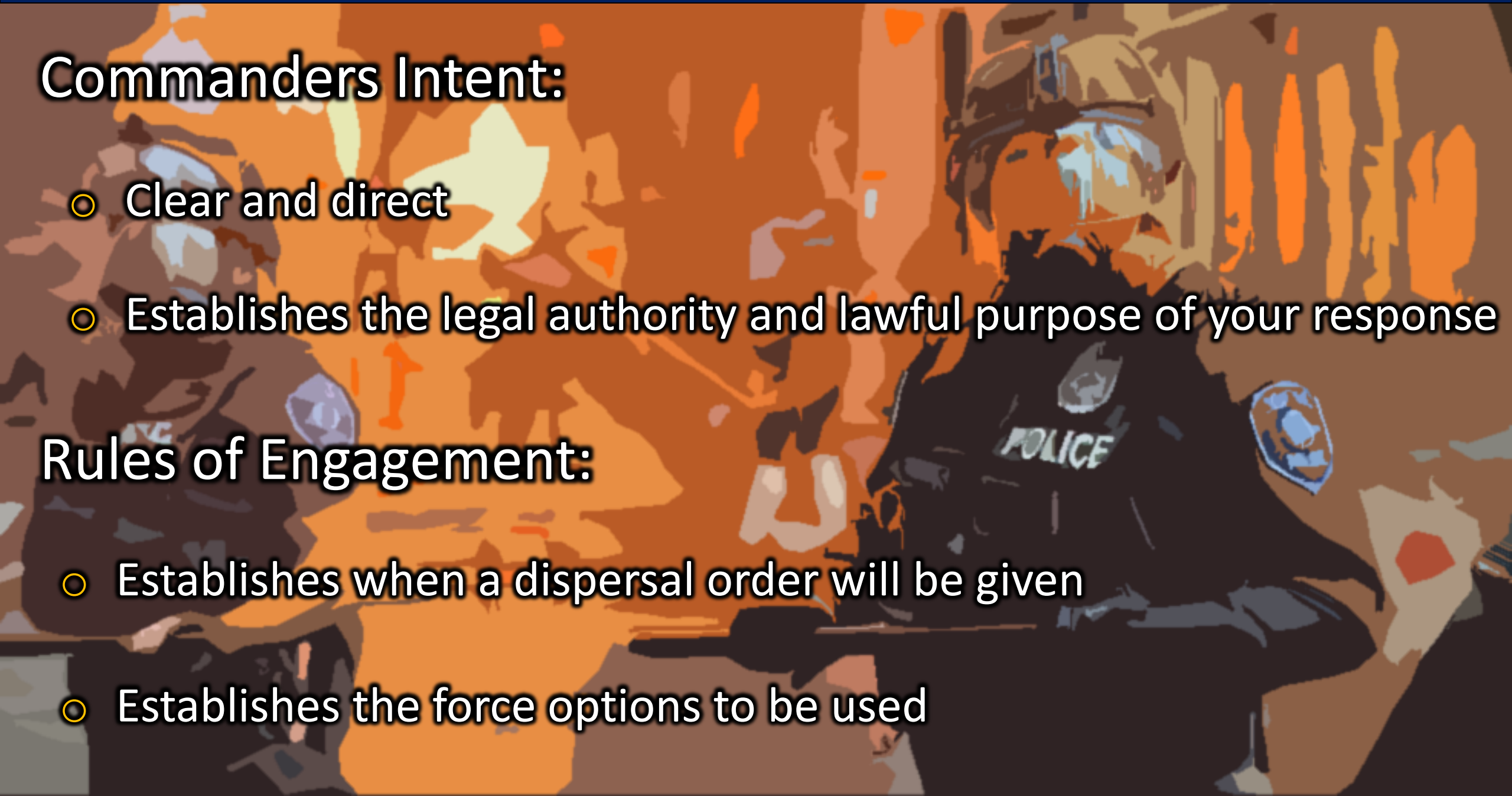
- Commanders Intent and Rules of Engagement-based on law and policy
 - Training
 - Logistics
 - Sustainment
- 

Commanders Intent:

- Clear and direct
- Establishes the legal authority and lawful purpose of your response

Rules of Engagement:

- Establishes when a dispersal order will be given
- Establishes the force options to be used



Training essentials:

- Command and leadership
- First line supervision/linebackers
- Officers
- CI, ROE, use of force, tools, reporting, and tactics

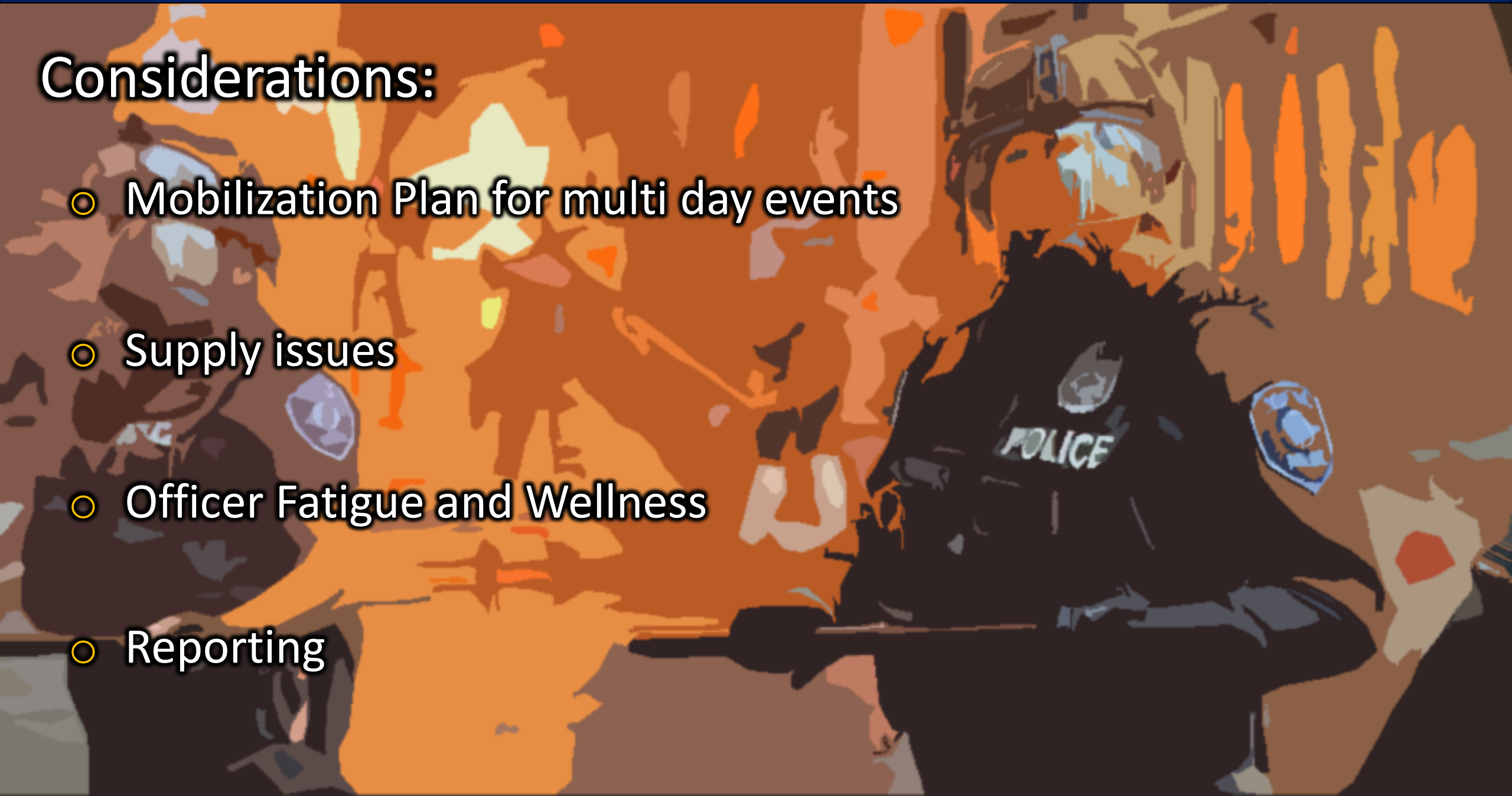


Areas of Concern:

- Staffing, Mutual Aid and Personal Protective Equipment
- Less lethal tools
- Food, water and breaks
- Arrests and reporting, prisoner processing and force reporting

Considerations:

- Mobilization Plan for multi day events
- Supply issues
- Officer Fatigue and Wellness
- Reporting
